Fr. Gerard's Corner

What shepherd would send a flock of sheep to a pasture overrun with wolves? Is this something a good shepherd would ever do? Yet Jesus, the Good Shepherd, here sends his disciples “like lambs among wolves” (Luke 10:3). Jesus wants his disciples to realize that this mission is difficult and potentially dangerous. He recognizes the burden the cross will bring. But he sends them in pairs (so they are not alone), without money or possessions (so they are not a target for thieves), offering peace (so they do not come or leave with hostility). He cares for them in the face of danger, as he cares for us all in the midst of suffering.

For the second week in a row, we hear Jesus counsel his disciples to refrain from retaliating. Last Sunday we heard Jesus rebuke his disciples when they wanted to call fire down from heaven upon villages that refused to accept them. Today we hear him insist that they merely move on if they are not welcomed. The disciples are to come in peace, offering peace, giving peace. Unlike money, which once spent is gone, the peace the disciples share can be given again and again, and if it is not received, it will return to them. Perhaps this is why Jesus specifically tells them to bring no money, but always offer peace.

Those returning to Jerusalem after decades in exile may have wanted to retaliate against the Babylonian captors, especially after seeing the state of their temple and city. But Isaiah’s words are full of nothing but joy: “Rejoice . . . be glad . . . exult” (Isaiah 66:10). Saint Paul is joyful as well in concluding his letter to the Galatians. The cross of Jesus and the marks of Jesus on his body are sources of strength and pride, not of shame and defeat. In closing, Paul too offers peace to all.


Peanut Butter & Jelly

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GOD'S PROVIDENCE

Today's readings celebrate God's providence. No matter how wonderful (or heartbreaking) our relationships are, God always provides for us. No one cares for us the way God does.

Isaiah delights us with a deeply intimate image of God caring for us "as a mother comforts her child." The prophet describes us not as the usual "children of God," but as "babies." We should not resist this image, but rejoice in it. Trusting in God's care, we can all let down our guard and rest like infants in the lap of our mother.

Saint Paul's trust in God allows him to be at peace like this. He boldly declares that no one can "make troubles" for him, because he has given himself completely to Jesus. And when Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal, he challenges them not to provide for themselves, but to let faith be their guide.

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Stewardship Reflection

In today's Gospel passage from Luke, we find our Lord appointing disciples to go out and prepare others to receive His invitation into the Kingdom of God. Every verse has something to say about the way a Christian steward should approach others. Let's look at least one of the coaching tips Christ gives.

"The Lord appointed seventy-two others whom He sent out ahead of Him in pairs to every town and place He intended to visit." In His wisdom, Christ sent His disciples out not as individuals but in pairs, as teams. This approach to evangelization certainly provided practical advantages. The disciples could lean on each other for mutual support and encouragement, helping each other to stay on task and to put their heads together to pray and problem-solve. This teamwork approach is just as relevant to us modern-day Christian stewards. It takes courage and commitment to go out and invite others into the Christian life. We need to work together to do it well.



But there is also symbolic importance to working in teams. It points to the reality that when we invite others to embrace the Good News of the Gospel, we are not merely inviting them into a belief system, but into a relationship with Christ and through that relationship, into Christ's family — our fellow Christian disciples near and far.

Our parish is our immediate spiritual family in this extended worldwide fold. We are not meant to live as isolated individuals within the parish any more than we are meant to live in isolation within our families. We are meant to be a community. That is why it is so important for us to foster a vibrant, supportive, welcoming parish life. This is why we emphasize hospitality as one of the pillars of stewardship. It is not enough just to point others to Christ, we must invite them to join us in community with Him; we must offer a place and mission for them in the Church and within our parish family.

El rincón del P. Gerardo

¿Qué pastor enviaría a su rebaño de ovejas a unos pastos infestados de lobos? ¿Habrá algún buen pastor que hiciera eso jamás? Sin embargo Jesús, el Buen Pastor, envía aquí a sus discípulos “como corderos en medio de lobos” (Lucas 10, 3). Jesús quiere que sus discípulos comprendan que esta misión es difícil y probablemente peligrosa. Él reconoce la carga que la cruz llevará consigo, pero los envía en pares (para que no estén solos), sin dinero ni bienes (para que no sean un blanco para los ladrones) y les pide que ofrezcan la paz (para que su ir y venir no sea con hostilidad). Jesús los cuida frente al peligro, así como nos cuida a nosotros en medio del sufrimiento.

Por dos semanas seguidas escuchamos a Jesús aconsejar a sus discípulos que se abstengan de tomar represalias. El domingo pasado oímos a Jesús reprender a sus discípulos cuando querían que bajara fuego del cielo sobre los pueblos que rehusaban aceptarlos. Hoy insiste en que ellos simplemente deben continuar su camino, si no son bien recibidos. Los discípulos deben venir en paz, ofrecer la paz y darla. Opuestamente al dinero, que una vez que se gasta ya no vuelve, la paz que los discípulos comparten puede darse una y otra vez, y si no es bien recibida, regresa a ellos. Tal vez por eso sea que Jesús les dice específicamente que no lleven dinero, pero que siempre ofrezcan la paz.

Aquellos que regresaban a Jerusalén después de décadas de exilio pudieran haber querido tomar represalias contra sus captores babilonios, especialmente después de ver las condiciones en que estaban su templo y su ciudad. Pero las palabras de Isaías están llenas de júbilo: “Gocen . . . alégrese . . . deleiten[se] con la abundancia de su gloria” (Isaías 66, 10). San Pablo también está alegre en la conclusión de su carta a los gálatas. La cruz de Jesús y las heridas en su cuerpo son fuentes de fortaleza y orgullo, y no de vergüenza y derrota. En resumen, también Pablo ofrece la paz a todos.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's high summer now, school is out, the pace of work slows, and some people drift away. There are visitors in the churches every summer, and familiar faces are "among the missing." Some find the summer's call more appealing than the summons of the church bells. Many, however, would not dream of missing a Sunday, and so they make their way to Mass in unfamiliar places, watching the locals for clues as to when to sit or stand, where the Communion stations are. In answering the call, they keep the "sabbatical" rhythm of the Christian life: every seventh day, the Body of Christ assembles for worship.

For centuries, there was no obligation to Sunday Mass in the sense of a written law, but Christians have always yearned to be together on Sunday. In the city of Abitina, during a persecution by the Emperor Diocletian, a group of Christians were urged to stop worshiping together on Sundays. They responded, "Then take our lives, for without the Sunday we cannot live." By a curious coincidence, the appointed readings today center us on thoughts of peace. On our Independence Day, the experience of worship situated us in community, and evoked a commitment from us to be advocates of peace in all aspects of our society's life.
