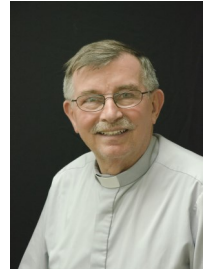

Fr. Gerard's Corner

In the first account of creation, from the first chapter of Genesis, light was the very first of God's creations. But it did not replace the darkness. Every night, the darkness overcame the light. But Isaiah prophesies about a new kind of light, a light that glorifies Jerusalem with the Lord's presence; a light that bursts through the darkness covering the earth; a light that draws pilgrims, riches, and praise from around the world. We look to Christ as that light. As we may have heard on Christmas Day, the light of Christ "shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5). Christ has the power to overcome any darkness in our lives. The light of Christ, shining all around the world, shining through our sisters and brothers, vanquishes our deepest darkness.



It is no surprise that Herod was greatly troubled when he heard the news of a newborn king, as his own kingship would be challenged, but Matthew tells us that "all Jerusalem" was troubled right along with him (Matthew 2:3). Why would they be troubled when Herod was a tyrant who did whatever was necessary to obtain and retain power? Perhaps Matthew is suggesting that Herod had such control over his subjects that they were too afraid to show any disloyalty. In any age, there are those who take comfort in the darkness, who fear the light.

The shepherds heard the glorious announcement on the night Jesus was born, but they were nearby and found the stable without a problem. The magi, however, required a journey of many days. But signs—an angel, a star—came to both, for there are no boundaries to God's invitation. As Paul would put it, we are all partners in Christ's promise.

Question of the Week The magi's encounter with Christ leads them to change the course of their journey. How is my journey changed by my encounter with the Lord?

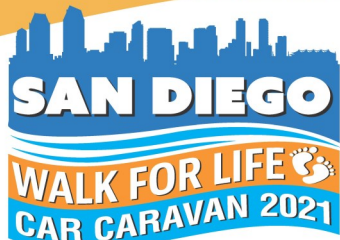

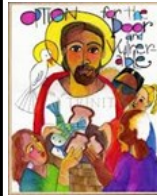

**U.S. Bishop Chairmen for Pro-Life and Doctrine
Address Ethical Concerns on the New COVID-19 Vaccines
DECEMBER 14, 2020 BY PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICE**

On December 14, Bishop Kevin C. Rhoades of Fort Wayne-South Bend, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Doctrine, and Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of Kansas City in Kansas, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Pro-Life Activities, issued a statement on the new COVID-19 vaccines. In their statement, the bishops address the moral concerns raised by the fact that the three vaccines that appear to be ready for distribution in the United States all have some connection to cell lines that originated with tissue taken from abortions.

With regard to the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, they concluded:

“In view of the gravity of the current pandemic and the lack of availability of alternative vaccines, the reasons to accept the new COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna are sufficiently serious to justify their use, despite their remote connection to morally compromised cell lines.

“Receiving one of the COVID-19 vaccines ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community. In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good.”

With regard to the AstraZeneca vaccine, the bishops found it to be “more morally compromised” and consequently concluded that this vaccine “should be avoided” if there are alternatives available. “It may turn out, however, that one does not really have a choice of vaccine, at least, not without a lengthy delay in immunization that may have serious consequences for one’s health and the health of others,” the bishop chairmen stated. “In such a case ... it would be permissible to accept the AstraZeneca vaccine.”

At the same time, the bishops also warned that Catholics “must be on guard so that the new COVID-19 vaccines do not desensitize us or weaken our determination to oppose the evil of abortion itself and the subsequent use of fetal cells in research.”

El rincón del Padre Gerardo

En el primer relato de la creación, en el primer capítulo del Génesis, la luz fue lo primero que Dios creó. Pero no reemplazó la oscuridad. Cada noche la oscuridad se sobreponía a la luz. Pero Isaías profetiza acerca de una luz nueva, una luz que glorifica a Jerusalén con la presencia del Señor; una luz que irrumpe en la oscuridad que cubre la tierra; una luz que atrae a peregrinos, que trae riquezas y alabanzas por parte de todos los pueblos del mundo. Nosotros sabemos que Cristo es esa luz. Habremos oído el día de Navidad que la luz de Cristo “brilla en las tinieblas y las tinieblas no la vencieron” (Juan 1, 5). Cristo tiene el poder de vencer cualquier oscuridad de nuestra vida. La luz de Cristo brilla por el mundo entero, brilla a través de nuestras hermanas y hermanos, y vence las oscuridades más profundas que podamos tener.



No nos debe sorprender que Herodes se haya sobresaltado cuando oyó la noticia del rey recién nacido, pues eso representaba un desafío para su propio reinado; pero Mateo nos dice que “toda Jerusalén” se sobresaltó también (Mateo 2, 3). ¿Por qué se sobresaltaron en esa ciudad si Herodes era un tirano, que hacía todo lo que fuese necesario para obtener y retener el poder? Quizás Mateo esté sugiriendo que Herodes tenía un yugo tan grande sobre sus súbditos, que éstos tenían miedo de demostrar cualquier tipo de deslealtad. En toda época, hay quienes se sienten cómodos en la oscuridad, porque le temen a la luz.

Los pastores oyeron el anuncio glorioso en la noche del nacimiento de Jesús y, como estaban cerca, encontraron el establo sin mayor problema. Los magos, sin embargo, tuvieron que hacer una travesía de muchos días. Pero las señales —un ángel, una estrella— se les ofrecieron tanto a los pastores como a los magos, porque no hay límites a la invitación de Dios. Tal como dice san Pablo, todos somos partícipes de la misma promesa en Jesucristo.

Por esa misma razón, las acciones y gestos de la liturgia, pertenecen a la comunidad porque son la obra de la comunidad misma, animada y convocada por el Espíritu Santo; aun así, el Espíritu Santo no anula la individualidad de cada miembro de la asamblea, que participa no a título propio sino como parte activa de una comunidad de bautizados que se llama Iglesia y que, domingo a domingo se reúne para celebrar el Reino de Dios por adelantado, para alabar y dar gracias a Dios por habernos dado a Jesucristo; para celebrar la pasión, muerte y resurrección de Cristo en comunión con toda la Iglesia y con el ropaje de la cultura a la que se pertenece y en la cual se ha asumido el Evangelio.

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Obispos Presidentes de los Comités de Actividades Pro-Vida y Doctrina abordan las preocupaciones éticas relacionadas a las vacunas contra el COVID-19 DECEMBER 14, 2020 | BY PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICE

El 14 de diciembre, el Obispo Kevin C. Rhoades, de Fort Wayne-South Bend, presidente del Comité de Doctrina de la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de Estados Unidos (USCCB) y el Arzobispo Joseph F. Naumann, de Kansas City en Kansas, presidente del Comité de Actividades Pro-Vida, emitieron una declaración sobre las vacunas contra el COVID-19. En su comunicado, los obispos se refieren a las preocupaciones morales derivadas del hecho de que las tres vacunas que parecen estar listas para su distribución en Estados Unidos tienen alguna conexión con líneas celulares originadas con tejidos extraídos de abortos.

En relación con las vacunas de Pfizer y Moderna, los obispos concluyen:

“En vista de la gravedad de la pandemia actual y la falta de disponibilidad de vacunas alternativas, las razones para aceptar las vacunas contra COVID-19 de Pfizer y Moderna son suficientemente válidas para justificar su uso, a pesar de su remota conexión con cepas celulares moralmente comprometidas.

Recibir una de las vacunas contra el COVID-19 debe entenderse como un acto de caridad hacia los demás miembros de nuestra comunidad. De esta manera, vacunarse de manera segura contra el COVID-19 debe considerarse un acto de amor al prójimo y parte de nuestra responsabilidad moral por el bien común”.

Con respecto a la vacuna de AstraZeneca, los obispos consideran que la misma está “más comprometida moralmente” y, en consecuencia, concluyen que esta vacuna “debe evitarse” si hay alternativas disponibles.

"Puede resultar, sin embargo, que alguien no tenga realmente una opción para vacunarse, al menos no sin sufrir un retraso prolongado en la inmunización, lo que pudiera tener graves consecuencias para la salud de la persona y la de sus semejantes", dijeron los dos presidentes de esos respectivos comités. "En ese caso... sería permitido utilizar la versión de AstraZeneca".

Por otra parte, los obispos advirtieron que los católicos “debemos estar alertas para que las nuevas vacunas contra el COVID-19 no nos desensibilicen ni debiliten nuestra determinación de oponernos al mal del aborto en sí y al posterior uso de células fetales en la investigación”.




